South Carolina Public Health Preparedness Student Corps (SCPHPSC)

Quarterly (3rd) Progress Report to Funder: Oct. 1 -- Dec. 31, 2022

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This quarterly report reflects outcomes of the 15-month grant funded (#NU90TP922168) project (SCPHPSC) that was designed to increase access to an interdisciplinary and sustainable pipeline of culturally competent students for emergency and public health response within local, state, and global communities. It reflects planned and unplanned activities of the project's implementation by South Carolina's Clemson University (CU) as lead organization and subrecipients Benedict College (BC), Claflin University (ClfU), Coastal Carolina University (CCU), and Francis Marion University (FMU).

Report data highlight 1) the number of new and total enrolled student participants and their academic majors/programs of study; 2) types of education, clinical, or leadership-centered project related events; 3) major activities/accomplishments completed; 4) challenges or departures from the project's work plan; 5) identification of technical resources needed from the SC Department of Health and Environmental Control (SC DHEC); 6) description of "new hires" to original project teams; 7) "other" noteworthy project related information; and 8) description of the lead organization's formal engagements with subrecipients. These data are presented, per program site, within headings A through H, of this report, as well as reported in summary.

The number of new project participants since the previous quarterly report is 106 -- contributing to the current total of 331 that represents 66.2% of the planned number (500) for the program period. Students' academic majors continue to be diverse, however, most (123) of the total population are enrolled in nursing/prenursing followed by public health (48) and biology related (65) disciplines. Project participants have engaged in leadership (e.g., project completion ceremony and public health advisory committee assemblies) and educational events with topics that ranged from Covid-19 pandemic discussions to SCPHPSC project onboarding/orientation sessions, medication point of dispensing (POD) demonstrations coordinated by two program sites and STOP THE BLEED® training. It is noteworthy that the latter three events were co-planned and coordinated with South Carolina (SC) Public Health Reserve Corps personnel.

While all project activities were deemed major accomplishments, those unique for the current reporting period consist primarily of program planning for project year#2 including project outcomes awareness and promotion. Examples include the following engagements planned for project participants: 1) emergency preparedness presentation targeting an entire campus community, 2) coordination of a diverse public health and health care professionals panel designed to offer information and insights about emergency preparedness career options, and 3) a how to stay safe during an earthquake drill seminar. Project promotional activities implemented sought to increase awareness of its processes and outcomes though presentations at professional forums. Presentation abstracts were submitted to the 2022 National Student Nurses Association mid-year; 2023 SC Public Health Association and National Black Nurses Association conferences; and 2023 National Association of County and City Health Officials Preparedness Summit. In addition, the project's health equity education modules (edited for no requested reflections statement/completion email) were shared (per request) with CU community health course faculty for integration within the School of Nursing curriculum. The same modules were shared (per request) with CU team member Dr. N. Malmin for integration within her graduate level public administration course during the spring 2023 semester.

Finally, there was one project implementation challenge identified, no technical needs from DHEC identified, and three new project personnel hired during this reporting period. The challenge was related to added effort in scheduling required project activities at times that fully complement students' schedules. However, this was resolved by convening multiple sessions/opportunities for student engagement. New hires consisted of a CU program coordinator and two co-investigators at CCU who replaced a team member who recently moved out of state.

Other noteworthy information shared reflects continued support for SCPHPSC by all subrecipients with one conveying confidence in having successfully developed a user-friendly student activities tracking system

that also complements the document upload process at the CU repository (i.e., tracking Excel spreadsheet). Finally, CU held formal engagements with subrecipients that included three monthly statewide meetings with meeting minutes being available for each.
